

#### Rector's Letter,

My DEAR FRIENDS-

It is with a deep and sincere feeling of regret that I am writing now to tell you that, after careful consideration and consultation with those who are concerned officially, I have written to the Bishop of the Diocese tendering my resignation as Rector of S. Mary's. This step has become necessary in the interests of the congregation, owing to my continued ill-health, which impairs my efficiency and often prevents (as you know) my taking part in the services. I take this opportunity of thanking you all most sincerely and gratefully for the sympathetic consideration and patience you have shown throughout, and which has done so much to cheer and help me.

My resignation will take effect on December 31, 1916, and until that date I hope to be able, as far as my health allows, to do what I can to assist with the services and pastoral visitation, and with the loyal and efficient help of Mr Shepherd to try and quicken and consolidate the spiritual life of the congregation, so that, if possible, the new Rector may have no leeway to make up. My chief concern is about the number of our younger communicants who have become somewhat slack and irregular lately with their Communions, and who do not come as they used to do to the early celebrations. It would cheer and encourage me much if those of you to whom these words apply would think the matter over, and make a fresh start with more frequent and regular Early Communion between this and Christmas. I want also to leave the Sunday School and the work of the Choir as efficient as possible, and for this I look with confidence for the loyal support and co-operation of the Sunday Schol teachers and members of the Choir. My work at S. Mary's during the past seven years has been a source of great happiness to me, and I hope to retain still, after my resignation, the many friendships I have made amongst all classes during that period.

I look forward with confidence to the future of the congregation, under the care of a younger and more vigorous pastor, and I am sure that you will give him all the help you can to enable him "make full proof of his ministry."

May God's blessing in all its fulness rest upon each one of you, and

# Visit of the Rev. the Hon. A. P. Erskine.

Mr Erskine, who is at present home on furlough from Kaffraria, will preach at Matins on October 15, and give an address to children in the afternoon at 2.45. Mr Erskine's visit is not for the purpose of collecting money, as our Foreign Mission collection will be taken as usual on a Sunday in November, but he is anxious to tell our Church people at home what is being done in the Diocese of S. John's, Kaffraria, and the need there is of continued interest and support. We hope to see a full Church on this occasion.

#### Harvest Festival.

We are arranging to hold our Thanksgiving Services for the Harvest—"The Festival of God's Providence"—on Sunday, October 22.

The chief thought in our minds on this occasion ought, we think, to be not only of the harvest to be gathered in in our own land, but also, and particularly, of the wonderful way in which, during this war time, our ships have been coming from over the seas laden with the necessaries of life. Many things have been scarce, and increased prices have taught us how to economise and practice selfdenial, but it is due to the watchful care and providence of God that we have hitherto been preserved from actual need. Let us thank God for this on the occasion of our Harvest Festival, and let us make one of the celebrations of Holy Communion (7, 8, and mid-day) our chief opportunity of personal praise and thanksgiving.

# The Call to Religious Revival.

There was a fair congregation on the occasion of Canon Perry's visit, and his address was most interesting and instructive. His points were—(1) The need of some kind of personal religious movement—a religion which is simply formal and conventional has no real power or vitality. (2) We must create the right spiritual atmosphere for our soldiers when they come back from the war, which will help to encourage those who have learned through their experiences at the Front something of the seriousness of life, and also to check those who may from reaction incline to recklessness of living. (3) We must aim at

making the Church and people a living whole.

(4) We must treat it as a personal matter, Trying to become more earnest in prayer, frequent in Communion, and Bible study. More concerned about the spiritual welfare of family life.

If only those who were present will remember his words, and try to interest and influence others in this movement, Canon Perry's visit will not have been in vain.

### Christmas Presents for the Front.

A meeting of those interested will be held in the Church Vestry on Wednesday, October 4, at 12 noon (after the Intercession Service), to discuss this matter. It may not be possible to do anything on the same scale as last year, in view of the enormous increase of prices, but those present may perhaps decide that some little acknowledgment may be sent to show our brave soldiers at the Front that they are not forgotten.
